Through our coordinated nutrition, P.E., and Caring School Community programs, students learn the importance of having healthy minds and bodies. Class sets of health instructional materials were provided for high school health teachers. In addition, other Board-adopted core curriculum materials were provided to remedy all insufficiencies identified through a survey and other activities at the annual Instructional Materials Hearing at the October 10, 2017 meeting of the Board of Education. All adopted high school instructional materials have been evaluated and determined locally to meet state standards for grades 9-12. Appropriate science laboratory equipment is available for all laboratory science courses.

For Elementary and Middle Schools (grades K-8)

The San Francisco Unified School District adopts instructional materials following the cycle of state frameworks and standards, and adopts K-8 materials from the list of standards-aligned materials that have been adopted by the State Board of Education. The district provides sufficient textbooks for all students to use in class and to take home in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history/social studies. For 2017-2018, instructional materials were provided for all students in grades K-8. Replacements were provided for core curriculum areas as identified through a survey and other activities preceding the annual Instructional Materials Hearing at the October 10, 2017 meeting of the Board of Education.

To modernize the school building and bring the school up to code to the ADA standards, FSK will be renovated from March 2011 to June 2012. All the kindergarten classes will have brand new classrooms with build-in restrooms starting the 2011-2012 school year. All the windows will be replaced. New shades, stage curtains, drapes, flooring, permanent module, play structure, accessible ramps, kitchen, office, lights, computer lab, roof, and balcony, etc. will be installed and built. The school will be painted indoor and outdoor. The greening project will start in the Fall semester of 2012.

A passenger zone has been established in front of the school on 43rd Avenue to allow parents to safely drop-off and pick-up their children daily. A crossing guard is on duty daily at the intersection of 42nd Avenue and Kirkham to ensure the safety of children crossing. The school maintains a high standard of student behavior and provides a strong nutrition and health program for students to grow and learn. A licensed on-site counselor is available to provide support services to students as needed. The school works collaboratively with Red Cross to develop a comprehensive emergency plan to ensure the safety of the faculty, staff, students, and parents in case of a crisis or other emergency situations.
