In addition, other Board-adopted core curriculum materials were provided to remedy all insufficiencies identified through a survey and other activities at the annual Instructional Materials Hearing at the October 10, 2017 meeting of the Board of Education. All adopted high school instructional materials have been evaluated and determined locally to meet state standards for grades 9-12. Appropriate science laboratory equipment is available for all laboratory science courses.

For Elementary and Middle Schools (grades K-8)

The San Francisco Unified School District adopts instructional materials following the cycle of state frameworks and standards, and adopts K-8 materials from the list of standards-aligned materials that have been adopted by the State Board of Education. The district provides sufficient textbooks for all students to use in class and to take home in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history/social studies. For 2017-2018, instructional materials were provided for all students in grades K-8. Replacements were provided for core curriculum areas as identified through a survey and other activities preceding the annual Instructional Materials Hearing at the October 10, 2017 meeting of the Board of Education.

School Facility Conditions and Improvements

The school is a beautiful building constructed in 1930 in a Spanish Revival style with art-deco interiors. Ten years ago the building exterior and the interior hallways were painted, and new floor tile was installed. There is a newly renovated science wing with spectacular views of the city and the Golden Gate Bridge. Recently we provided lighting in the school yard, and upgraded our auditorium, dance studio, cafeteria and gymnasium sound systems. We are currently improving our computer labs and classrooms to increase the use of technology for instruction and student projects. The school elevator was recently upgraded. The administration responds immediately to reports of maintenance and/or repair needs.

Regular drills and practices are held for various emergency possibilities. Presidio Middle School is partners with community agencies as well as the SFFD/SFPD to work on safety and support issues in our neighborhood. Staff members have had instruction in various life saving techniques and first aid. Students receive instruction on acceptance of diverse cultures, personal responsibility and an understanding of the laws, rules and regulations of our society and school district. We have very high behavior and discipline standards for our students which include a zero tolerance policy for fighting and hate violence. We reinforce a positive school climate by providing anti-bullying curriculum and restorative practices.
