All adopted high school instructional materials have been evaluated and determined locally to meet state standards for grades 9-12. Appropriate science laboratory equipment is available for all laboratory science courses.

The San Francisco Unified School District adopts instructional materials following the cycle of state frameworks and standards, and adopts K-8 materials from the list of standards-aligned materials that have been adopted by the State Board of Education. The district provides sufficient textbooks for all students to use in class and to take home in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history/social studies. For 2018-2019, instructional materials were provided for all students in grades K-8. Replacements were provided for core curriculum areas as identified through a survey and other activities preceding the annual Instructional Materials Hearing at the October 9, 2018 meeting of the Board of Education.

School Facility Conditions and Improvements

The school is a beautiful building built in the 1920's. The classrooms and hallways currently being used were painted in the summer of 2009 and two classrooms received new linoleum floors. Beautiful tiles wrap the walls along the auditorium and hallways. The auditorium floor is newly refinished. Game lines for the yards were painted in November 2011. ADA/Modernization planning has begun and by June 2012, all modernization work will be complete. Modernization work includes widening doorways, adding a new elevator at the Haight Street entrance, and a school garden. A technology lab was assembled in November 2010 and will be used to support students in attaining the standards.
