Appropriate science laboratory equipment is available for all laboratory science courses.

We are very proud of our beautiful building; the Aptos community celebrated its 80th anniversary in August 2011. In exterior of the building was painted during the Summer of 2006, and still looks great. The 18 month construction project to meet ADA standards and to renew our historic building was completed in Novemver 2010. It included a complete interior renovation, including remodeling, and new paint, flooring, and ceilings. In addition, the Aptos Playground, supervised by the department of Park and Recreation, was renovated in 2007. The park is used by the PE classes on a daily basis.
