E.R. Taylor is a unique school located in a quiet neighborhood in the southeast section of S. F. with a variety of programs to support student achievement. The school consists of Pre-K - 5th grade classes with ELD, Spanish Bilingual, and Chinese Bilingual classrooms available. The motto of our school is that our students are 'College Bound' and there are many activities to support this vision. In addition we have a Family Liaison, a Community Relations Specialist, 1.5 School Social Workers, a School Nurse and partnerships with Edgewood and the Excel After School Program to provide family support services to help our parents/guardians support their children to reach their potential. Taylor is a National Blue Ribbon School for 2009 and we have received the Title One Academic Achievement Award from the State of California. In addition, Taylor is a State Shining Star School for our Comprehensive Student Support Services and has been named a California Distinguished School. A successful graduate of E.R. Taylor will:

- Be able to speak another language (Spanish, Chinese, sign language, coding)
- •Be a lifelong learner
- •Have had a well-rounded education

Appropriate science laboratory equipment is available for all laboratory science courses.

The San Francisco Unified School District adopts instructional materials following the cycle of state frameworks and standards, and adopts K-8 materials from the list of standards-aligned materials that have been adopted by the State Board of Education. The district provides sufficient textbooks for all students to use in class and to take home in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history/social studies. For 2018-2019, instructional materials were provided for all students in grades K-8. Replacements were provided for core curriculum areas as identified through a survey and other activities preceding the annual Instructional Materials Hearing at the October 29, 2019 meeting of the Board of Education.

There has been a variey of updates over the last 15 years and Prop A ADA and safety improvements have been completed during this time. We have ADA accessible bathroom facitilities, ramps, a fire alarm system, fire sprinklers and improved exits.

15 years ago the Taylor staff wrote a grant to build a garden on the side of the school, this is maintained by students, staff and families and has added to the beauty of our neighborhood. Our partnership with Education Outside provides a Gardening program. Last year, turf was installed on the school yard that is used for soccer and other activities.

We are moving in the direction of implementing Restorative Practices and Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports on a schoolwide basis. The children are aware of the schoolwide expectations. Discipline issues are handled respectfully and restorative practices are used to solve problems among the students. There is an extensive Disaster Plan in the event of an earthquake or emergency which includes collecting disaster food packets and plans for an evacuation of the school if necessary.

There are many supplemental Services at Taylor. We have 1.5 School Social Workers, and a full-time School Nurse. Through our partnership with Edgewood, we have a Behavior Consultant, as well as two therapists who conduct individual and group sessions for students. We also participate in the College Bound program, which two of our staff members co-coordinate. The School Health Programs Office also supports our program with a Nutrition Program, which is coordinated by the After School Program Coordinator. Our College Bound Program includes student field trips to universities in the area, as well as opportunities for parent involvement. Our partnership with Playworks provides the Team Up program, which includes professional development for our Community Relations Specialist, teachers, and noon aides to promote student engagement during recess as well as the Class Game Time program during physical education. Taylor has an afterschool Homework/enrichment program five days a week for students needing extra support. We have two full-time Resource Specialists, a Speech Therapist, a SOAR Special Day class, and a Literacy Specialist.
